Jo Webber, PhD, is a professor of special education at Texas State University–San Marcos and associate dean for academic affairs for the College of Education. She began teaching students with autism in 1976 and has been active as a consultant, in-service and preservice trainer, author, and statewide leader in this area for 30 years.

Dr. Webber received her doctoral degree in special education from The University of Texas at Austin and served as the executive director of the Austin–Travis County Mental Health and Mental Retardation Autism Center, executive director of the Communities in Schools Dropout Prevention Program, and assistant special education director for the Austin Independent School District. She co-authored, with Brenda Scheuermann, the textbook *Autism: Teaching DOES Make a Difference* (Wadsworth, 2002) and, with Cindy Plotts, the textbook *Emotional and Behavioral Disorders: Theory to Practice* (Allyn & Bacon, 2002).

She received her doctoral degree in emotional disturbance/autism from The University of Texas at Austin.
