Definitions of the Three Behavior Categories Addressed in This Instrument

1. Disruptive Behaviors

Behaviors that cause turmoil, confusion, or disorder. For example, a student who constantly talks out and disrupts the teacher's instruction.

2. Defiant Behaviors

Behaviors that oppose, resist, or challenge authority. For example, a student who threatens other students or the teacher.

3. Difficult Behaviors

Behaviors that are hard to manage and prevent the student from getting along with others. For example, a student who teases other students.
