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## Your RFVII-3 Results

You recently completed the *Reading-Free Vocational Interest Inventory–Third Edition*, and here are your results! This report is based on your choices.

## Career Clusters and the Information They Provide

The U.S. Department of Education has designated 16 Career Clusters. These clusters are groups of occupations and industries that share certain features. The 16 broad categories include virtually all occupations, from entry through professional levels.

Career Clusters are a convenient way to explore the many occupations available. As you become more aware of careers and do some exploring, your RFVII-3 results will help you zero in on a broad group of careers that match your interests. Once you have that information, you can investigate the educational requirements, salary, and job tasks you wish to achieve.

## People, Data, or Things Help to Classify Occupations

Another way of exploring occupations is to look at how much the job involves working with people, data, or things. Jobs can be described by the percentage of time spent working with people, data, or things. Although most jobs involve working with all three, one of the three may be the main focus. Try listing all job responsibilities under one of the three categories to learn what major role an employee will be expected to fulfill.



Agriculture, Food, and Natural Resources—producing, processing, marketing, distributing, financing, and developing agricultural commodities and resources, including food, fiber, wood products, natural resources, horticulture, and other plant and animal products



Hospitality and Tourism—planning, managing, and providing restaurant and food/beverage services, lodging, travel and tourism, recreation, amusement, and attractions



Architecture and Construction—designing, planning, managing, building, and maintaining the built environment



Human Services—planning, managing, and providing services related to families and human needs, such as counseling and mental health services, family and community services, personal care, and consumer services



Arts, Audio/Video Technology, and Communications—designing, producing, exhibiting, performing, writing, and publishing multimedia content, including visual and performing arts and design, journalism, and entertainment services



Information Technology—designing, developing, supporting, and managing hardware, software, multimedia, and systems integration



Business Management and Administration—planning, organizing, directing, and evaluating business functions essential to efficient and productive business operations



Law, Public Safety, Corrections, and Security—planning, managing, and providing legal, public safety, protective, and homeland security services, including professional and technical support



Education and Training—planning, managing, and providing education and training services and related learning support services, such as administration, teaching/training, administrative support, and professional support services



Manufacturing—planning, managing, and performing the processing of materials into intermediate or final products and related professional and technical support activities, such as production planning and control, maintenance, and manufacturing engineering



Finance—planning and related services for financial and investment planning, banking, insurance, and business financial management



Marketing—planning, managing, and performing marketing activities to reach organizational objectives, such as brand management, professional sales, merchandising, marketing communications, and market research



Government and Public Administration—planning and executing government functions at the local, state, and federal levels, including governance, national security, foreign service, revenue and taxation, and regulations



Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics—planning, managing, and providing scientific research and professional and technical services, including laboratory and testing services and research and development



Health Science—planning, managing, and providing therapeutic services, diagnostic services, health information, support services, and biotechnology research and development

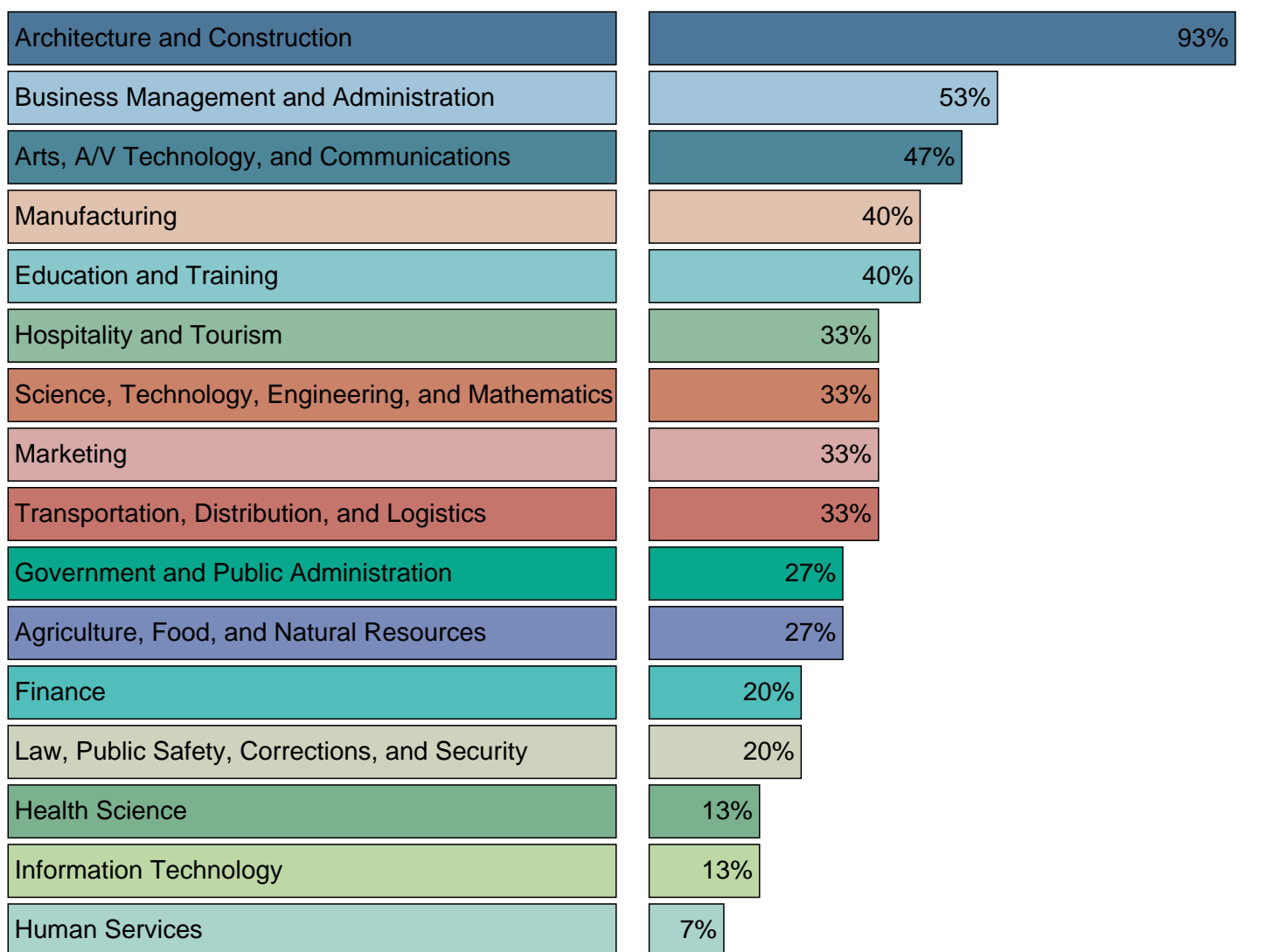


Transportation, Distribution, and Logistics—planning, managing, and moving people, materials, and goods by road, pipeline, air, rail, and water, and providing related professional and technical support
