

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## Dear Parent/Caregiver,

In class, we've been learning about expressing opinions. We've also talked about the fact that people have different opinions about things. It's important for your child to know how to express her opinion in a way that is clear to other people.

Here are some ways you can help your child practice expressing opinions.

- When making family decisions, sit down together and discuss various options. Have everyone give his or her opinion. Then vote on what to do. For example, you might want to decide what curfew should be on weekends, where you should go on vacation, or which movie to watch as a family.
- When family members have different ideas on what should be done, have each member write her thoughts on a sheet of paper. Next read the ideas aloud without telling who wrote each one. Then have everyone vote on which idea they agree with most.
- Talk about everyday issues, comparing your opinions. You might talk about family gatherings, a recent movie you've seen, current fashions, local news events, or even politics.
- Read an editorial from the newspaper together. Talk about whether you agree or disagree with the writer's point of view.

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Understanding others' opinions and the ability to express her own opinions will help your child become a better reader, writer, and communicator.


