- Picture 1: Matt has some **binoculars**. Matt is going to look for **birds**.
- Picture 2: Matt looks through the binoculars a first time. He sees a **bluebird** sitting in the tree.

- **Picture 4:** Matt looks through the binoculars a **third** time. He sees Molly sitting in the tree! Matt says, "Hey, you're not a bird. You're a **girl**!"


Suggested Props
