

Career Clusters and the Information They Provide

The U.S. Department of Education has designated 16 Career Clusters. These clusters are groups of occupations and industries that share certain features. The 16 broad categories include virtually all occupations, from entry through professional levels. Sometimes these clusters are referred to as Industry Sectors.

Career Clusters are a convenient way to explore the many occupations available. As you become more aware of careers and do some exploring, your CIPSI results will help you to zero in on a broad grouping of careers that matches your interests and strengths. Once you know that, you can investigate the educational requirements, salary, and job tasks you wish to achieve.

Click on the career cluster or scan the QR code to find detailed information and SOC numbers for occupations in each Career Cluster.

Agriculture, Food, and Natural Resources—producing, processing, marketing, distributing, financing, and developing agricultural commodities and resources, including food, fiber, wood products, natural resources, horticulture, and other plant and animal products



Hospitality and Tourism—planning, managing, and providing restaurant and food/beverage services, lodging, travel and tourism, recreation amusement, and attractions



Architecture and Construction—designing, planning, managing, building and maintaining the built environment



Human Services—planning, managing, and providing services related to families and human needs, such as counseling and mental health services, family and community services, personal care, and consumer services



Arts, Audio/Video Technology, and Communications—designing, producing, exhibiting, performing, writing, and publishing multimedia content, including visual and performing arts and design, journalism, and entertainment services



Information Technology—designing, developing, supporting, and managing hardware, software, multimedia, and systems integration



Business Management and Administration planning, organizing, directing, and evaluating business functions essential to efficient and productive business operations



Law, Public Safety, Corrections, and Security planning, managing, and providing legal, public safety, protective services, and homeland security, including professional and technical support



Education and Training—planning, managing, and providing education and training services and related learning support services, such as administration, teaching/training, administrative support, and professional support services



Manufacturing—planning, managing, and performing the processing of materials into intermediate or final products and related professional and technical support activities, such as production planning and control, maintenance, and manufacturing engineering



Finance—planning and related services for financial and investment planning, banking, insurance, and business financial management



Marketing—planning, managing, and performing marketing activities to reach organizational objectives, such as brand management, professional sales, merchandising, marketing communications, and market research



Government and Public Administration—planning and executing government functions at the local, state, and federal levels, including governance, national security, foreign service, revenue and taxation, and regulations



Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics—planning, managing, and providing scientific research and professional and technical services, including laboratory and testing services and research and development



Health Science—planning, managing, and providing therapeutic services, diagnostic services, health information, support services, and biotechnology research and development




Transportation, Distribution, and Logistics planning, managing, and moving people, materials, and goods by road, pipeline, air, rail, and water and related professional and technical support

Career Cluster





To understand your data, follow these steps:

- In the Personal Interests column, circle every score you have that is 50% or higher. Review the related Career Clusters and cross out any that you have very little interest in.
- In the Strengths column, circle every score you have that is 50% or higher. Review the related Career Clusters and cross out any that you have very little interest in.
- Review across columns and find where you have circled high percentages in both columns.
- Look back at the list of Careers you selected as interesting. Notice the Career Clusters to which they belong. Place a check mark for each career by the Cluster names in your Interests and Strengths table.
- Compare to find the Clusters that have the highest % in each column and the most check marks. These Career Clusters represent both your interests and your strengths, and they are excellent places for you to begin your exploration!
- There may not be a Career Cluster that shows high percentages in both interests and strengths. Start by identifying the highest percentages in one column and then scanning the other column for percentages that come close to 50%. These matches are also good Career Clusters to explore.
